The evenings events will include the free dinner catered by the Schnitzlebank Restaruant,




vendor table top displays, dinner music by the Stephen Greenwell Band, door prizes, green drinks - all with a St. Patrick's Day theme.

And the other person says: "So what are you up to?"


What kind of question is that? At that point, I'm thinking this is too bizarre so I say: "Uhhh, I'm like you, just traveling!"

WATER OR COKE?

This is really an eye opener.... Water or Coke? We all know that water is important but I've never seen it written down like this before.

WATER

- 1. 75% of Americans are chronically dehydrated.
- 2. In 37% of Americans, the thirst mechanism is so weak that it is often mistaken for hunger.
- 3. Even MILD dehydration will slow down one's metabolism as much as 3%.
- 4. One glass of water will shut down midnight hunger pangs for almost 100% of the dieters studied in a University of Washington study.
- 5. Lack of water, the #1 trigger of daytime fatigue.
- 6. Preliminary research indicates that 8-10 glasses of water a day could significantly ease back and joint pain for up to 80% of sufferers.
- 7. A mere 2% drop in body water can trigger fuzzy short-term memory, trouble with basic math, and difficulty focusing on the computer screen or on a printed page.
- 8. Drinking 5 glasses of water daily decreases the risk of colon cancer by 45%, plus it can slash the risk of breast cancer by 79%, and one is 50% less likely to develop bladder cancer.

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RECOGNIZE STROKE SYMPTOMS

Sometimes the symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness spells disaster. The stroke victim may suffer brain damage when people nearby fail to recognize the symptoms of a stroke. Now doctors say a bystander can recognize a stroke by asking three simple questions:

- · Ask the individual to smile.
- Ask him or her to raise both arms.
- Ask the person to speak a simple sentence.

If he or she has trouble with any of these tasks, call 9-1-1 immediately and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher. After discovering that a group of non-medical volunteers could identify facial weakness, arm weakness and speech problems, researchers urged the general public to learn the three questions. They presented their conclusions at the American Stroke Associations annual meeting last February. Widespread use of this test could result in prompt diagnosis and treatment of the stroke and prevent brain damage. Tell as many people about this as possible. It could save their lives.

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Good to Know

ATTORNEY'S ADVICE -- NO CHARGE Read this and make a copy for your files in case you need to refer to it someday. Maybe we should all take some of his advice!

A corporate attorney sent the following out to the employees in his company.

- 1. The next time you order checks have only your initials (instead of first name) and last name put on them. If someone takes your checkbook, they will not know if you sign your checks with just your initials or your first name, but your bank will know how you sign your checks.
- 2. Do not sign the back of your credit cards. Instead, put "PHOTO ID REQUIRED".
- 3. When you are writing checks to pay on your credit card accounts, DO NOT put the complete account number on the "For" line. Instead, just put the last four numbers. The credit card company knows the rest of the number, and anyone who might be handling your check as it passes through all the check processing channels won't have access to it.
- 4. Put your work phone
 # on your checks
 instead of your home
 phone. If you have a PO
 Box use that instead of
 your home address. If you
 do not have a PO Box, use your work
 address. Never have your SS# printed on
 your checks. (DUH!) You can add it if it
 is necessary. But if you have it printed,
 anyone can get it.
- 5. Place the contents of your wallet on a photocopy machine. Do both sides of each license, credit card, etc. You will know what you had in your wallet and all of the account numbers and phone numbers to call and cancel. Keep the photocopy in a safe place. I also carry a photocopy of my passport when I travel either here or abroad. We've all heard horror stories about fraud that's committed on us in stealing a name, address, Social Security number, credit cards.

Unfortunately, I, an attorney, have first-hand knowledge because my wallet was stolen last month. Within a week, the thieve(s) ordered an expensive monthly cell phone package, applied for a VISA credit card, had a credit line approved to buy a Gateway computer, received a PIN number from DMV to change my driving record information online, and more. But here's some critical information to limit the damage in case rthis happens to you or someone you know:

- 1. We have been told we should cancel our credit cards immediately. But the key is having the toll free numbers and your card numbers handy so you know whom to call. Keep those where you can find them.
- 2. File a police report immediately in the jurisdiction where your credit cards, etc., were stolen. This proves to credit providers you were diligent, and this is a first step toward an investigation (if there ever is one).

But here's what is perhaps most important of all: (I never even thought to do this.)

3. Call the 3 national credit reporting organizations immediately to place a fraud alert on your name and Social Security number. I had never heard of doing that until advised by a bank that

called to tell me an application for credit was made over the Internet in my name. The alert means any company that checks your credit knows your information was stolen, and they have to contact you by phone to authorize new credit.

E-filing and direct deposit

The 2005 tax filing season is now here, and it is time to start thinking about filing your tax return and you should be thinking e-file and direct deposit. Tax filing season 2004 resulted in nearly 60 million taxpayers using IRS e-file and more than 49 million choosing to receive their refunds by direct deposit.

When you e-file, you don't have to worry if the mail gets through. E-file is so accurate that you are 99% less likely to receive any notices from the IRS. E-filing is fast, safe, secure, and accurate. If you e-file your tax return and have your refund direct deposited, you will get your refund faster.

The use of direct deposit for federal income tax refunds has grown steadily in the last several years. The IRS is looking for 87,485 taxpayers whose refund checks could not be delivered. Taxpayers can avoid undelivered refund checks by having their refunds direct deposited into their personal checking or savings account. Direct deposit also guards against theft or lost refund checks.

A taxpayer may use direct deposit with both paper and e-filed returns. Taxpayers who choose to e-file their tax return and use direct deposit get their refunds faster-in as little as 10 days. For example, a taxpayer who e-files their tax return and the IRS accepts it by noon on February 17, 2005 will receive their refund in their bank account by February 25, if they chose to direct deposit. If the taxpayer chooses to have their refund mailed, they will not receive their paper check until March 4 or later, depending on the number of refund checks the IRS is trying to process at that time.

If you are planning to have your refund direct deposited for 2005, you will need to supply the IRS with some information on your tax return. On your 2005 tax return, you will need to indicate on the refund portion of the tax return your financial institution's routing transit number, your account number, and whether you want the refund deposited into your checking or savings account. If your tax return is prepared by a tax professional, make sure you tell them you would like your refund direct deposited and supply them with the necessary bank information to prepare your return.

If you think you are going to receive a refund for 2005 and you want to receive your refund quickly, then choose to e-file your return and direct deposit your refund.


